◆ Fill out your Club Excellence Applications given to your President during the Governor's visit. Each one of your club deserves to applaud your


accomplishments, and let the world know.



AN IMPORTANT MESSAGE ABOUT BRANCH CLUBS!

Hello everyone,

Please see the bullet points on how to start a Branch Club below. Please see the Club Branch Guide, Club Branch Application and Report of Branch Membership form attached. This is a great way to offer five or more people who maybe cannot join your club but can meet and do their own Lions thing.

The key concepts are:

- A Parent/Host club is needed -
- The Branch is covered by the LCI Umbrella Liability insurance policy
- One time cost of \$25.00 per member for installation cost - (\$125.00 for 5 people to start) Parent club can help defray cost
- Recurring costs to Branch club members are dues of \$67.00 per year (that's 5.88 per month) plus any dues they want to charge themselves
- Branch determines when, where, and how many times they want meet & if they want to have food/ refreshment or whatever.
- Branch has a structure of President, Treasurer, Secretary plus standard members and a parent club liaison who stays in touch by phone or in person or social media or they chose best method
- Branch Club members can go to the parent club regular and board meetings if they chose
- If the Branch grows to 20 and more members, they can convert to traditional club very easily




Region I—Zone 3 & 4




VANDEMBERG VILLAGE LIONS CLUB DISTRICT 4-A3 NUMBER ONE CLUB

Mr. Durham has been involved in the effort since 2000. The Every 15 Minutes Event alternates between Cabrillo High School and Lompoc High School every other year. This year’s event, at Lompoc High School, the stage accident will occur at Huyck Stadium on April 20th, with the school assembly following on April 21st in the school gym. The public is invited and encouraged to attend. The Vandenberg Village Lions Club made a donation to the cause.


